

Helping those in a cause is more impactful than prioritizing those outside it.



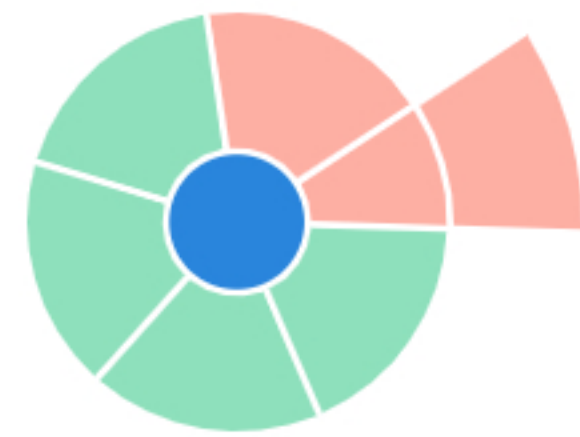
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Background
