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Tasting Forbidden Flavors



- If people have aversions to something (like something becomes a taboo), they'll ban it
- If there are severe health issues (with meat, it's that it's carcinogenic), a product can be banned.
- Even if a ban's lifted, people may still not want to eat it, due to aversions.
- Something associated with the past (like eating animal products) or some disliked demographic (maybe meat eaters in a vegan world) could lead to a ban.
- If something's great enough to replace a banned product (such as the cow for horse or artificial meat for real meat), then people will not worry about a ban.
- If animal products were banned, these 'illegal flavors' could end up as artificially replicated forms on flavor deliverers, such as potato chips, without having to go back to the real animal itself for that taste.
 - food technology can recreate what we don't have, and in the future, it might be even better.
